

This is a signed, mainly traffic-free 14km / 8¾ mile route between Huddersfield and Dewsbury town centres. It is ideal for family leisure cycling or to facilitate a cycle journey to work. Much of this route is surprisingly rural passing through a pleasant wooded and agricultural landscape.

Most of the path is built on the former rail corridor of the Midland Railway, with the section from Dewsbury Moor to the town centre on a riverside path. It comprises the Birkby Bradley Greenway National Cycle Network Route 69 and Calder Valley Greenway National Cycle Network Route 66. Some sections of the Calder Valley Greenway are available to horseriders.

The route is a partnership between Kirklees Council, Sustrans, Yorkshire Forward, Yorkshire Water, Environment Agency and other landowners.

A section of the route between Mirfield railway station and Huddersfield Road has still to be developed, so an interim on-road route is signed.

Scenic views

V1 The Riddings – the elevation of the path alongside the Riddings woodland provides long distance views across Huddersfield to the Stadium and Dalton Bank.

V2 Bradley Viaduct – (cover photo) the 15 high arches of the spectacular blue brick viaduct carry you over the River Colne and Huddersfield Broad Canal.

V3 Lower Spen – the open aspect of the path gives long views up the Spen Valley to Norristhorpe and Roberttown.

V4 River Calder – the bridge takes the route across the Dewsbury flood alleviation channel with an excellent view of the river and weir.

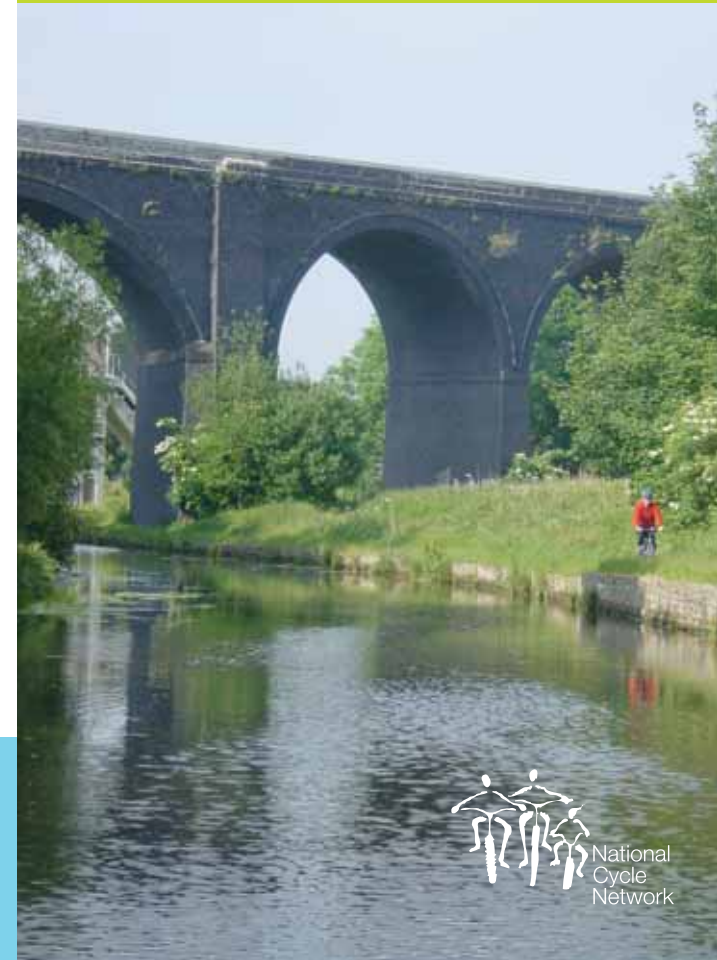

1 Galpharm Stadium, Huddersfield

The Huddersfield Broad Canal runs from Aspley Basin to Colne Bridge. British Waterways permit cycling on the towpath; apply online www.waterscape.com/cycling/permit.html and follow the Waterways Code. The Calder & Hebble Navigation runs for 21 miles from Wakefield to Sowerby Bridge. It connects the Aire and Calder Navigation at Wakefield with the Rochdale Canal at Sowerby Bridge and Huddersfield Broad Canal at Cooper Bridge. British Waterways permits cycling on some sections of towpath around Dewsbury (see map).

4 Savile Town Canal Basin
Savile Town Canal Basin is a working boatyard on the Dewsbury Cut. Visit the Leggers Inn or the Old Stables Coffee Shop, the ideal refreshment stop for cyclists and walkers.

5 Dewsbury Museum

Located in Crow Nest Park, next to the café, you can experience things that have changed in the lives of children over the last century. There's also a busy programme of temporary exhibitions and events. Dewsbury Museum is a must for anyone who's ever been a child.

6 Holroyd Park
Local amenity with multi-activity games area, playgrounds and bowling.

7 Dalton Bank Local Nature Reserve
A mix of conifer plantations and native woodlands, the grassland is alive with crickets and other insects in the summer and offers a good place to hunt for fungi in the autumn.

8 Lower Spenn Valley Local Nature Reserve
The Spenn River runs through this nature reserve and you might be lucky enough to see a kingfisher diving for minnows or other small fish. New ponds have been created and these are being left to re-colonise naturally.

Additional cycling opportunities

At Dewsbury Moor, the Calder Valley Greenway joins the Spenn Valley Greenway for a distance to Scout Hill. Turning north, the Spenn Valley Greenway continues north through Heckmondwike, Liversedge and Cleckheaton. A new bridleway link at Low Moor skirts Victoria Park to Bierley, from which a signed route leads to Bradford City Centre.

- Calder Valley Greenway to Brighouse, Horbury Bridge and Heckmondwike
- Earlsheaton to Ossett Greenway
- Deighton to Dalton Greenway

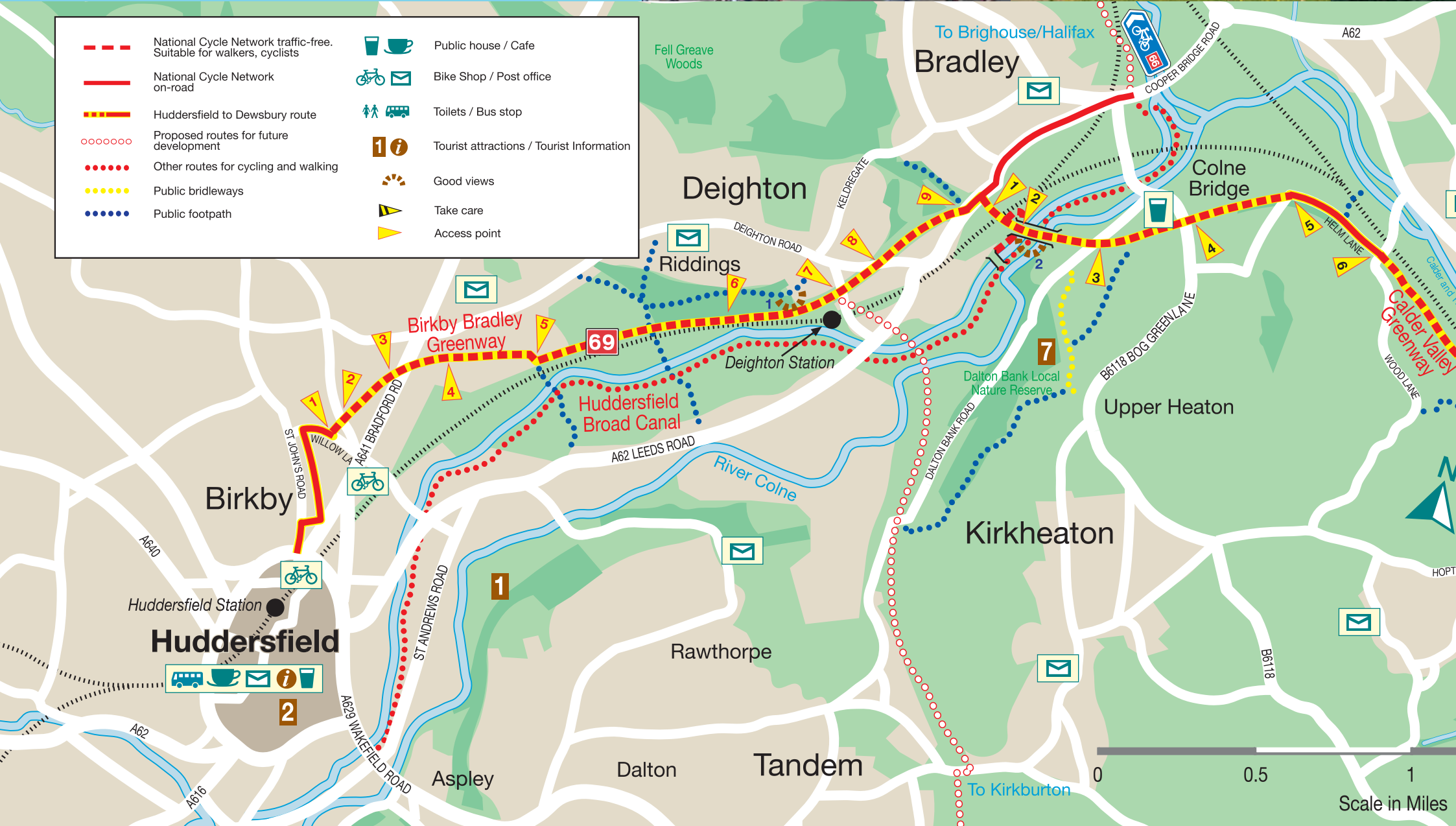
Horsriders are able to use the Calder Valley Greenway from access point 1 to point 11 and the Spenn Valley Greenway.
